The Keystone Bike Park Crew has transformed a ridge line of drops into a free fall for you. Choose from four alleys of multiple features all located off the Paid-in-Full trail.

- Alley 1 (Piranha, Barracuda and Jaws)—Small, medium or large drops ranging from 5 to 22 feet.
- Alley 2 (Paranoid)—Rock Drop with a natural take-off and narrow wood landing
- Alley 3 (Voodoo)—Rock Garden
- Alley 4 (Witch Doctor) Bridge launch into natural landing with berm runoff

Freeride Bike Terrain

Freeride Terrain may contain manmade or natural terrain variations. They are provided for your enjoyment and offer adventure, challenge, and fun. However, Freeride Terrain use exposes you to risks of serious injury. Prior to using Freeride Terrain, it is your responsibility to familiarize yourself with all instructions and warnings, and follow the rules of the trail.

1. Freeride Terrain changes constantly due to weather and use.
2. Inspect Freeride Terrain before using and throughout the day.
3. In using Freeride Terrain you assume the risk of serious injury.
4. It is your responsibility to control your bike.
5. Always ride in control and within your ability.

Construction Warning:

Due to a high volume of construction traffic, Jackstraw Road will be closed to all uphill and downhill bike traffic. Bike trails and the Summit Express chairlift may be closed periodically as construction dictates. Please be aware of construction zones, maintenance vehicles, heavy equipment and obey all posted warnings and closures. For bike crew assistance, please use the mountain emergency phones (bright red boxes) or call (970) 496-4000.

NORBA Code

All mountain bikers must obey the NORBA Code

1. I will yield the right-of-way to other non-motorized trail users.
2. I will use caution when overtaking another and will make my presence known well in advance.
3. I will maintain control of my speed at all times.
4. I will stay on designated trails.
5. I will not disturb wildlife or livestock.
6. I will not litter.
7. I will respect public and private property.
8. I will always be self-sufficient.
9. I will not travel solo in remote areas.
10. I will observe the practice of minimum impact bicycling.
11. I will always wear a helmet whenever I ride.

- Lift-Served, Bike Park Trails**—Riders will experience uneven terrain with roots, step-downs, rocks and uphill traffic.
- 3-P Road (1.5 Mile)** A dirt service road which accesses the beginning of Mosquito Coast and Let It Ride. Please use caution as you may encounter motorized vehicles.
 - Bluegrass (.25 Mile)** A fun, short single-track through the aspen groves and open ski runs—a great alternative to Jackstraw Road.
 - Boy Scouts (.5 Mile)** Rolling single-track across ski trails and through lodgepole pines. Two bridge crossings.
 - Celtic Way™ (.5 Mile)** Connects Let It Ride to Bluegrass—winding & twisting across open ski trails and lodgepole pines.
 - Easy Street (.25 Mile)** Easiest access to the River Run base area.
 - Girl Scouts (1.25 Mile)** Turning single-track through lodgepole forest and across open ski trails. Great view of Lake Dillon.
 - Keystone Bike Path (6 miles to Dillon)** Continuous paved trail network which extends from the Ski Tip Neighborhood to the River Course.

- Let It Ride™ (2.75 Miles)** A fun "roller coaster ride" across ski trails and through the woods.
- Ride On™ (.25 Mile)** A fun shortcut between Let It Ride and Boy Scouts.
- Sleepy Hollow (.5 Mile)** Rolling single-track through aspen & pines. This trail is also a good uphill route.
- Suz's Cruise™ (1 Mile)** Connects bottom of Girls Scouts to top of Mosquito Coast via a rolling, twisting single-track—short, but sweet. A great "Green" single-track experience.
- Timbers Trail (.25 Mile)** Scenic shortcut through big pines along the Snake River.
- 11-7 (1.75 Mile)** A scenic high altitude gradual climbing loop offering spectacular vistas. This is also a great family hiking trail—watch for pedestrians and bikers!
- Eye of the Tiger (1.25 Mile)** This rolling trail winds in and out of the forest and offers bridges, berms and rocks with the option to try more difficult, expert features.
- Mosquito Coast (1.25 Mile)** A steep and twisty glide around the meadow and across two amazing bridges.
- River Run Trail (.75 Mile)** Single-track trail that winds across ski runs leading to the base of the Summit Express Lift.

- Cowboy Up** This short but sweet trail offers tight technical turns, log drops, and a huge rock garden.
- Money** The name says it all—22 table tops with massive berm turns.
- Motorhead** Flowing single-track with berms, steps, table tops, doubles, bridges, and rocky descents.
- Paid-in-Full** Open ski run that weaves in and out of trees with stunts, high-speed features & alternate lines.
- Punk Rock** Short, technical, single-track boulder field.
- TNT** Aggressive descent on overgrown mining and logging roads. Look for the Ida Belle's mine off to your right.
- East Forest**—Rolling, fast, flow downhill through the forest with our longest bridge ever leading to an exciting 14' tall corkscrew feature.
- Even Flow**—This is a steep trail with switchbacks and one of our longest northshore bridges with many unique feature options.
- Helter Skelter**—This pair of trails utilize the steep terrain around an old power line, including some rocky descents and optional jumps.
- High Speed Dirt** Tight winding turns through the woods and over some steeper rocky sections, with multiple options.

- Iam Rock** Features and rocks galore – five larger jump options and a rocky forest with progressive line choices.
 - Milky Way** Flowing single track with sweeping flat turns and multiple features for advanced riders.
 - Wild Thing** A technical, narrow single-track, with tight twisting turns, steep and rock drops through large aspen stands.

- Rules of the Trail**
Uphill Traffic always has the Right-of-Way. Bikers Yield to Pedestrians and Equestrians. Bikers and Pedestrians Yield to Equestrians.

- Surrounding Cross Country Trails**—These trails are close to the bike park and offer some interesting, challenging, and longer rides.
- Keystone Gulch Road* (6.25 Miles)** Dirt service road from The Outpost to the valley floor. Travel between North Peak and The Outback mountains, following the Keystone Gulch creek and passing several beaver ponds. Popular uphill route. Please use caution as you may encounter motorized vehicles.
 - Erickson Mine* (1.3 Mile)** Head downhill from The Outpost. Climb over rocky terrain through a huge alpine bowl. The mine sits just above timberline on a tundra-covered slope.
 - Granny's Trail™* (1.25 Mile)** A great way to test your skills on single-track trails. Travel the valley floor of Keystone Gulch Road to the Mountain House base area.
 - West Ridge Loop* (6.5 Miles)** Using logging roads, explore the remote slopes of West Ridge. You will encounter long climbing switchbacks and two stream crossings. Access to the Colorado Trail at the top of the ridge.
- * These trails are NOT patrolled.
